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PROJECT DOMINICANA JUNE 15-24, 2019

Looking for adventure and a way to grow your faith? Do what Jesus said to do: love your neighbors in the Dominican Republic. Project Dominicana is LCPC's mission to Haitian immigrants living in the Dominican Republic.

Now in its 17th year, this experience has been life-changing for many adults and high school students. This year's trip will give us the opportunity to strengthen friendships and continue work that

is touching the lives of the very poor. You do not have to be part of the LCPC family to participate, but you should be a person who is seeking to know more about Jesus.

Partnering with our friends from the Beraca Church in the poor village of Kilometer 6, we will continue building houses in that barrio. We will also send a medical team to offer remedial health care to poor Haitian-Dominicans living on the sugar cane plantations. This year's trip will include five and a half days of work along with Bible studies, regular worship, and evening recreation. We



will also spend some time debriefing at a beautiful beach at the end of the trip.

Our main goal in the DR is simple and compelling. We want to enhance the work of our sister churches as they reach out to the very poor and introduce them to Jesus. I hope you will prayerfully consider how you might help to encourage these efforts either as a team member or a support partner.

We look closely at the Bible and consider the teachings of great theologians and Bible scholars. Then we enjoy open conversation focusing on real life struggles and victories.

PASTOR'S LETTER

Dear friends,
Last month the LCPC Session conducted a special meeting to discuss the strategic plan that will guide us for the next two years

(January 2019 through December 2020). "All Eyes on God: 2020 Vision" was the product of much prayer, research, conversation and debate over the course of 18 months. I'm so grateful for the sense of unity and the sheer excitement that pervaded that meeting. The plan was amended and adopted and has now become a roadmap for us.

We have already shared many of the general ideas from the plan at various public gatherings (for example, during worship on Vision Sunday). But all of us on the LCPC leadership team are eager to share additional details with you. More than that, we're praying that starting this month, everyone in the family will fix their eyes on the Lord and on the good work He is preparing for us to do.

You will have many opportunities to hear the details of the plan and learn how you can get involved. For now I want to articulate some of the key ideas that guided our thinking as the plan was developed. And I want to let you know the plan for sharing the vision over the next few months.

The core idea guiding the plan is that we want to do everything we can to encourage "Kingdom Growth."

There are two aspects to the kind of growth we envision. We seek "discipleship growth" in those who know Christ and have given their lives to Him and we yearn to see growth in new believers. We want people who don't know Christ or maybe have been drifting away from Him to receive new life in His name. The emphasis isn't on numerical growth, though that will come as the Spirit moves. Rather, it's on reaching out to our neighbors and sharing Christ where they live.

Another idea that continues to shape our vision relates to the money God has entrusted to us in the form of estate funds. We strongly believe the Lord is calling us to invest those funds in His ongoing work. We don't believe He wants us to hold the money in a perpetual endowment, or to use it to pay regular, ongoing expenses so our congregation will be relieved of the obligation to give to LCPC. Our friends left their extraordinary gifts to LCPC so we would use it to advance Christ's work in extraordinary ways. So we plan to invest the estate money we have recently received in missions and in dynamic projects related to our church campus that we believe will lead to "Kingdom Growth." The goal is to spend the money within a two-year window.

Even though my instinct is to squeeze every last penny 'til it screams, I'm all in for this plan. We're not a college or a charitable foundation. We're a church

that's called to do everything we can, here and now, to advance the cause of Christ. So I say: let's spend wisely, but let's spend now. (You will hear much more about specific spending projects very soon.)

A third idea guiding our strategic plan is that we want to become more radical in our outreach to the community and beyond. What does that mean? We're going to create a challenge grant fund that will help people turn their ministry dreams into a reality. We're going to ramp up – way up – on our work on the Casa de Los Angeles Orphanage and Hispaniola Partners in the Dominican Republic. And we're going to be more intentional about connecting long-time church members with seekers and new believers. We believe in mentoring. So the goal is to mobilize several groups within the church to help in ministries of discipleship. We've already started within Fellowship Ministry with events that are designed to help newcomers connect with the church family.

How will we share the plan, fan the flames of excitement and mobilize the church family?

First, the Session will be generating a brief, one-page overview of the "All Eyes on God: Vision 2020" plan. You'll receive it along with a letter from me. It will also be widely available at the church and online.

Second, the Session will be organizing a series of town hall style meetings to explain various aspects of the plan and solicit ideas for implementation. The 90-minute meetings will be open to everyone. Topics will include: mission work, improvements to the church campus and technology, strategies for improving our use of digital media, nurturing fellowship and deepening discipleship, sharing Christ with our neighbors, and more.

At this point you may be wondering: Will the plan work? Yes, absolutely, if we put our backs into it. That means getting excited about the work the Spirit is leading us into. It means adding that essential

ingredient to everything we attempt: *Enthusiasm*. Nothing works without enthusiasm. And nothing succeeds like enthusiasm as we lean into the work of the Spirit.

I want to end with Paul's benediction from his letter to the Ephesians. May these words inspire our thoughts and deeds over the next two years:

Now to him who is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine, according to his power that is at work within us, to him be glory in the church and in Christ Jesus throughout all generations, for ever and ever! Amen. (3:20-21)

Our Deacons are in charge of tasks such as sending birthday/get well/sympathy cards, organizing rides for those who cannot drive on their own (including to church events and services, the doctor, shopping, etc.), sending out grief booklets, making sure the worship service hearing aids work, organizing the annual Blood Drive, taking the Sunday flowers to members of the congregation, meals home delivery, visitations, the Food Pantry, taking the minutes of our monthly meetings, and chairing the meetings.

Each of us has the privilege of serving in those capacities and in helping to serve special meals and with other events at church during the year. We feel blessed to be part of the mission of the church, pointing others to Christ and showing how His redeeming love is what saves.

Please consider ways you can help others, looking outside yourself, and seeking God's will in your life. Each day is an opportunity for service.

Come join us as we learn how to interpret our world in light of God's promises and faithfulness.

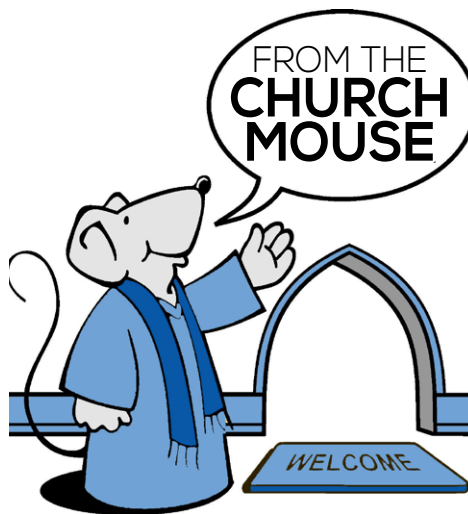
